Missions and Outreach

Our Outreach was The Keeling Concert on April 28 and was very well attended. It was wonderful to see the sanctuary filled with so many smiling and excited faces. Everyone enjoyed the camaraderie and musical message The Keelings brought. With help from some of our congregation, we were able to collect and pack 16 boxes of food, a total of 275 food items! The food has been picked up by The Salvation Army and Community Services.

The Mission's Team will be taking a special offering for the next few weeks for the tornado victims in Okalahoma. This will coincide with our Blanket Sunday offering which is normally taken on Father's Day, for Church World Services. CWS is an organization specifically for helping in natural disaster areas. They supply warm blankets, clean up kits, necessity kits, etc. They are trying to help make it easier for those in the disaster area while they try to get their lives back to normal. Recovery may begin with a bucket of supplies, but it doesn't end until everyone has a chance to recover.

Please, prayerfully consider giving to this very important cause. If you will be writing a check, make it out to RGAPC and in the memo write, tornado victims, or if you are going to give cash, put it in one of the Blanket Sunday envelopes, or one of the offering envelopes in the pews, and write tornado victims on that envelope and just drop it into the collection plate along with your usual Sunday offering.

Next on our agenda is the Mustard Seed Missions; this is a new local mission project in our own area. The Missions' Team has made Mustard Seed Missions one of our recipients with our undesignated funds. Mustard Seed Missions is a faith-based, Venango County church collaborative, reaching out, touching lives in our community based on referrals from the County of Venango and other social service agencies. Church laypeople have been installing windows, giving rides, visiting the downcast, building beds, cleaning houses, helping people move, repairing roofs and porches in the name of Jesus Christ. If you are willing to help with any of these types of jobs, please let Debbie Dunlap know so that a list can be compiled of people to call when just such a need becomes known. The Mustard Seed Missions states: We are not just a social service; nor are we just an evangelism arm of our churches. We are a mixture of both.

We ask that you keep all these worthy mission projects and the people involved in your prayers.

Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, he should do it as one speaking the very words of God. If anyone serves, he should do it with the strength God provides so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the glory and power for ever and ever. Amen. 1 Peter 4:10-11
