From the Pastor's Study: F.R.O.G.

Dear RGAPC family and friends,

Do you know anyone who is passionate about collecting things? I don't mean a random accumulation or hoarding, but a serious, intentional, "looking for the very best examples" kind of collector? My step-mother is one of those folks. Joan collects frogs. From jade ornaments and blown-glass figurines to clocks and throw-rugs, from thimble-sized peepers to ceramic bullfrogs large as a soccer ball, frogs are her specialty. At last count she had well over 5,000 of them. How do we know? Believe it or not, she keeps a log-book listing when and where she obtained every single one.

Nestled in with about 300 other specimens in a glass-fronted case in her dining room is a small silver frog pin Joan received many years ago when she was hospitalized after a terrible car accident. The pin came on a pre-printed card which read simply, F.R.O.G: Fully Rely On God. And on the back, a hand-written note: "Fully rely on God, dear friend, for he is faithful. And know that we are continually praying for you." Throughout her long recovery, Joan kept that silver pin – and its encouraging message — close to her side and close to her heart. Now, 30 years later, she keeps it where she will be reminded, every single day: FROG.

Many in the church (or our friends and family members) are going through major challenges right now. Some struggle with poor health or troubled relationships. For others, the difficulties are financial. Our congregation, too, is facing challenges as it seeks to be faithful to Jesus Christ in accordance with biblical witness in a time of cultural and denominational change.

These are serious matters -- but they are also invitations to a deeper faith and Christian practice. "Trust in the Lord with all your heart; lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways submit to him, and he will make your path straight." And let us love one another and our neighbors in the name and the power and the Spirit of Jesus Christ, to the glory of God.

Responding to Denominational Issues

from the newly-formed "Re-Affirmation Team"

Dear church family,

Most of you are aware that our denomination – the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) – is experiencing rapid change. The change is not in the number of churches or pastors . . . not in the kind of buildings or style of worship . . . not even in the use of technology. The change we refer to relates to what denominational leaders believe (and seminary students and church members are being taught), about God, salvation, and scripture.

<u>How did we get here?</u> From the early days of the Protestant Reformation, the Presbyterian "branch" of the Christian faith has held certain convictions. These include (among other things):

- the sovereignty of God;
- the Lordship of Jesus Christ;
- the Scriptures as the authoritative, inspired Word of God;
- the testimony of the Scriptures that salvation comes by grace alone, through faith alone, in Jesus Christ alone;
- the belief that, having been saved by God's grace, Christ's followers are called and empowered by the Holy Spirit to live in grateful obedience to God, in accordance with the plain teachings of the Bible.

Presbyterians have also placed high value on allowing freedom of thought and belief. In other words, we are not required to all think exactly the same way - and this is good! The church *needs* to be wide enough to include people from different ethnic groups, different economic circumstances, with different personalities and points of view. But over the last forty years the PC(USA) has been moving away from the traditional beliefs of our Presbyterian heritage and toward a new blend of theological liberalism that allows people (even ministers) to "pick and choose" the parts of Scripture they wish to believe and follow.

This movement toward theological liberalism did not happen overnight and it did not happen equally in all parts of the country. Western Pennsylvania has largely continued to hold traditional, orthodox beliefs. The members of Lake Erie Presbytery, while fairly diverse in their theological views, are gracious and respectful of one another. But across the denomination there has been increasing division, discord and distrust as "progressive" voices have become increasingly numerous and vocal.

<u>The New Majority</u> For several decades, there was a kind of uneasy balance. The PC(USA) was growing more theologically diverse, but traditional values and practices were largely upheld in votes on major issues. But about four years ago, the "more liberal" wing of the denomination gained a slim majority and almost immediately introduced numerous changes.

For example, the PC(USA) now permits the ordination and installation of elders, deacons and ministers who are active in sexual relationships outside the covenant of marriage between a man and woman. At the General Assembly in Pittsburgh last summer, there was extensive debate about changing the PC(USA) constitution to re-define marriage as a relationship between two persons instead of between a man and a woman. This proposal was defeated by a narrow margin but will undoubtedly come up again in 2014.

Under current Presbyterian governance, no church can be forced to ordain and install elders, deacons or ministers it does not approve of. And no PC(USA) pastor can be required to officiate at a same sex 'marriage' even where such is permitted by state law. RGAPC is absolutely free to teach and uphold traditional, biblical beliefs, values and standards of conduct. But we are still part of the presbytery, and choices made by other parts of the denomination do have an effect on us here in Rocky Grove.

So, how is RGAPC responding to all this?

For many years, this congregation has been praying about the direction of the PC(USA). In the last few years, our prayer and discussion have greatly intensified. When the change in ordination standards was announced, many members were deeply disappointed in the denomination but expressed their continued commitment to serving Jesus Christ in and through this local congregation.

Last fall Pastor Sue led a Sunday morning study of some corner-stones of the Presbyterian-Reformed faith (see the first page of this article), including a discussion of the ways these cornerstones are understood within the PC(USA) today.

Through ongoing prayer and conversation, the Session has become convinced that the PC(USA) -- as a denomination -- is headed in a very bad direction. Session began to consider whether it might be appropriate for RGAPC to consider moving from the PC(USA) to another Reformed denomination, by a process called "dismissal."

On November 11, 2012 Session held an information meeting with the congregation in order to share concerns about the direction of the PC(USA). A large percentage of those who attended that meeting indicated they were in favor of exploring the possibility of seeking to be dismissed.

So, Session 'did what Presbyterians do' -- they formed a committee (actually, a team) to begin actively exploring the possibility of dismissal. Included are five ruling elders (Linda Hartman, Phyllis Wetzel, Jim Sandok, George Wielandt and Wayne Edmondson), as well as a deacon (Darlene Exley) and trustee (John Klinger) chosen by those respective boards. The team felt it was important to choose a name reflecting the focus of their efforts. Thus, they will be known as the "Re-Affirmation Team," indicating their hope that their efforts will result in the members of our congregation being able to re-affirm their faith and commitment to Jesus Christ in a denomination that supports historical Presbyterian-Reformed beliefs and biblical standards.

The Presbytery has a process for churches that wish to discuss the possibility dismissal. There is no set time or duration for the process, but it is designed to allow plenty of opportunity to gather information and discuss various options and possibilities. The Session held a special meeting on February 24th at which it voted unanimously to ask the Presbytery to begin the process of discussing dismissal.

The Re-Affirmation team is committed to keeping you, the church members, regularly informed about our activities. You can expect a monthly newsletter article and occasional updates in worship. We ask for your prayers and for your participation in information meetings when those opportunities arise. In the near future we will also establish some method of submitting questions. This is still very much a time of listening and discernment. We cannot emphasize enough that no decisions have been made, other than to continue to explore where God may be leading us.

Ultimately, what we want is to be faithful to Jesus Christ. There is no other goal. This is not about "running away" or "giving up" but about "moving beyond." We want to be able to move beyond arguments about biblical interpretation and human sexuality. We want to move beyond denominational discord, so that we can move toward Spirit-led fruitfulness as together we live and share the wonderful gospel of Jesus Christ.

Ronald and Louise Moorhead Scholarship - New Information

This scholarship was established to support active members of the Rocky Grove Avenue Presbyterian church who are planning to further their education after high school. During the Session meeting on December 10, 2012, Session approved the following guideline for a "regular attendee" for scholarship consideration: A regular attendee will attend worship services and/or other church related activities at the Rocky Grove Avenue Presbyterian Church an average of once per month during the two years prior to going to college (or technical or vocational school). MISSIONS CORNER

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING is an offering that we at RGAPC traditionally take during Lent. This offering was started in 1949 when Americans were asked to give in response to the devastation of World War II. This has been an ecumenical offering from the get go, in that many Christian denominations work together for the offering. Each denomination gives some of the gifts received for shared ministry through Church World Service. However, each denomination decides how the gifts its members give will be used. Presbyterians divide the offering into thirds – 36% to Presbyterian Hunger Program, 32% to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and 32% to Self-Development of People.

This year's theme is "SHARING BRINGS JOY TO OTHERS, TO GOD AND TO US." So, let us share our resources and support the OGHS programs with continued, or better yet increased, support. Last year's offering totaled \$383.53. I challenge you to increase your giving and increase your joy to others, to God and to yourself.
