#### A Mother's Day Reflection

Mother's Day is not known as one of the great holidays of the church

may fruitfully learn from going back to the roots of this holiday.

The observance of Mothers Day can be traced back to Anna Jarvis, a Methodist who lived in Grafton, West Virginia. Anna Jarvis was inspired her mother, Anna Reeves Jarvis, who in the 1850's organized "Mothers Work Day" clubs in that area. These volunteer groups provided medicine for the poor, arranged nursing care for the sick, and ran shelters for children with tuberculosis and other serious illnesses.

When the Civil War broke out, Anna Reeves Jarvis called together the women involved in the Work Day Clubs. She asked them to make a pledge that friendship and good will would not become a casualty of the war, and they gladly agreed. Throughout the long and bloody conflict, the women nursed soldiers from both sides. It was difficult, challenging work, but their efforts saved many lives.

When the war was over and all the wounded soldiers were released from medical care, Anna Reeves Jarvis saw the need for another kind of healing by

the healing of family ties. And so she turned her energy toward organizing "Mothers Friendship Days," for the purpose of helping to reconcile families from both the North and the South, whose relationships had been torn asunder by the civil war.

Anna Jarvis -- the daughter -- was born in 1850. From the time she was a very young child, she watched her mother live out her Christian faith by helping other women work together in ministries of compassion and reconciliation. In 1907, two years after her own mother's death, she organized the first "Mothers Day" in her home town of Grafton to honor the women who had devoted so much of their energy to serving others. The idea quickly spread, and in 1915 President Woodrow Wilson established the national observance of Mother's Day to be held the second Sunday of each May. This year, as we honor our own mothers and the mothers among us, may God stir up in each one of us the deep desire to serve others in the name and the Spirit of Jesus.
