From the Pastor's Study:

Dear RGAPC family and friends,

Those of you who read the Derrick or News-Herald may have seen an article on August 25th by Rev. Scott Woodlee, the pastor of the Franklin Christian Missionary Alliance Church. As he was driving past a field of soybeans not long ago, he saw some stalks of corn poking up here and there above the low-growing soybeans. Even though corn is a valuable crop, *those* stalks were out of place, taking up nutrients needed by the main crop. In that sense they were simply weeds.

Pastor Scott uses this metaphor of corn among the beans to urge us to choose carefully what things we will allow to "grow" in our field in the different seasons of life. "By sowing our lives with too many crops (being involved in too many things) we end up creating a smaller yield. It is healthier and more productive to simplify and rotate our crops through the seasons." He ends his article with the exhortation, "Let's go weed-whacking!"

I've thought about this article a lot over the last few days. All of us – myself included – can benefit from the reminder that *busier* is not *better*. Too many activities, too many projects, can drain our energy and our focus. At the same time, let's not make the mistake of just cutting out the more difficult or challenging things in life. Students might prefer texting friends to doing homework, but what is more valuable in the long run?

It might also be that we need to *add* something to our "field" of life. Some of us may need to add quality time to build strong relationships. Some may need to add exercise to keep our bodies strong and flexible. Some may need to add a time for quiet, to let the stresses and distractions of life fade into the background so we can more clearly sense the presence and guidance of God.

As summer moves toward fall, may the fields around us be a rich reminder that God is the master gardener. May all our choices glorify Him and be a lasting testimony to the redeeming grace He has poured out on us through Jesus Christ. In His love,

Approved Motions from the Session Meeting – August 13th:

• Minutes of the regular Session Meeting of 16 Jul 12.

- Financial Secretary's report for the period ending 31 July 12 and the following Treasurer's reports: checking account summary, budget year-to-date and Financial Report for July 2012.
- Minutes of the Congregational Life and Worship Ministry Team meeting on 30 Jul 12, Stewardship Ministry Team meeting on 5 Aug 12, Missions and Outreach Ministry Team meeting on 23 Jul 12, Trustee's Meeting on 6 Aug 12, and Aug 2012 Report on Administrative Activity.
- Pastor Sue's request for one week of study leave on 22, 23 and 24 Aug, 15, 16, 17 and 28 Oct 12, and for a week of vacation from 31 Oct through 7 Nov 12.
- Changes to the following sections of the Administrative Manual to meet current procedures and practices: Section 306 Nom inating Committee (these changes will be presented to the congregation during formal congregational meetings for their approval); Section 603 Clerk of Session; Section 605 Stewardship Ministry Team; Section 607 Personnel Ministry Team; Section 620 Financial Advisory Group (note: section eliminated because this group no longer exists); Section 902 Shepherd; Section 1007 Financial Secretary/Assistant Financial Secretary; Section 1101 Funds; Section 1102 Chart of Current Expense Accounts; and Section 1104 Miscellaneous Policies.
- To transfer "in kind" the Horizon, Siefer Scholarship Fund and Moorhead Scholarship Fund Accounts from Stifel Nicolaus to Edward Jones.
- Permission to the Trustees to go forward with the project to install stair lifts along the stairs between Moorhead Hall and the landing on the west side of the building, and along the stairs between this same landing and the narthex.
- Two requests from the Boy Scouts Troop #28: 1) to conduct a fund-raising meal in Moorhead Hall on Sunday, 14 Oct 12, with setup Saturday evening and understanding that donations must be on a free-will basis rather than a set cost. and 2) to conduct a Christmas tree sale on 8 and 9 Dec 12 as long as they do not place the trees on the pavement.
