

From the Pastor's Study

Dear RGAPC family and friends,

A couple of months ago my husband and I were at a fast-food place in Meadville when I overheard a group of young people talking about the recent television mini-series, "The Bible." Actually, they weren't talking – they were arguing about whether Jesus ever really lived, and if the New Testament contained an accurate record of what Jesus did, what he taught and what he calls us to do. In other words, they were asking, "How do we know that the Bible is reliable?"

This is a timeless question. It has been asked over and over again through the centuries, and yet has enormous relevance for us today -- as individuals, as members of a particular faith community (RGAPC), and as citizens living in the United States of America. The Apostle Paul wrote, *"Every part of Scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or the other – showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the Word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us." (2 Timothy 3:16-17, The Message translation). Martin Luther, John Calvin and other Protestant Reformers insisted that the Bible alone contains God's written word and is, therefore, the highest and completely trustworthy authority for faith and life.*

In these first decades of the 21st century, most of us are bombarded with an overflow of information. Television, radio, newspapers, magazines, the internet – words and images continually flow our way. Most of them claim to be true, or at least worthy of our consideration. Many of these sources make fun of, distort or completely dismiss the Bible. Tragically, even in our own Reformed, Presbyterian denomination it has become common to rely more on "logic" and "science" than on the clear teachings of the Bible.

So this brings us back to the question – how DO we know that the Bible is reliable? Let's look at the following facts. FACT: The Bible is the most closely studied ancient text in the history of the world. The reliability of an ancient text is largely based on the time interval between when it was written and the most ancient copy available to scholars. Most of the "historical facts" about the early history of Western civilization are derived from ancient writings by the following five authors.

Herodotus lived and wrote around 488-428 BC. The earliest copies of his writings date around AD 900, a gap of 1,300 years. There are eight copies.

Thucydides, lived and wrote around 460-400 BC. The earliest copies of his writings date around AD 900 - a gap of 1,300 years. There are eight copies.

Tacitus lived and wrote around AD 100. The earliest copies of his writings date around 1100, a gap of 1,000 years. There are 20 copies.

Julius Caesar wrote his Gallic Wars around 58-50 BC. The earliest copies of his writings date around AD 900-950. There are ten copies.


Livy wrote his History of Rome around 5 to 15 AD. The earliest copies date around AD 900, a gap of 900 years. There are twenty copies.

By comparison, the New Testament was written between AD 40-100. The earliest "miniscules" (partial copies) date around AD 130, only a generation after composition. Full manuscripts of the New Testament date, at the very latest, around AD 350, three hundred years after composition. There are over 5000 Greek miniscules and manuscripts available. There's another 10,000 in Latin, plus an additional 9,300 ancient copies in other languages. And apart from very minor variations, the oldest available manuscripts and recent English translations read precisely the same.

FACT: There is more textual evidence for the story of Jesus and the 1st-century Church of Jesus Christ than the history of Greece and Rome. Considering how many early Christian writings exist, it is significant that no Jewish or Roman documents of that same period dispute Jesus' existence.

FACT: Some scholars may not believe the message of the New Testament. After all, it is a faith document. However, even non-believing experts in biblical languages agree that the New Testament accurately records the original authors' message.

So not by "faith" alone, but by logic also, we can say with confidence that the Bible is completely reliable. And while we are talking facts -- the fact is, the Bible is also a love letter. It is God's love letter to a lost and lonely and hurting world. In it we find hope, healing, consolation, correction, comfort, encouragement, challenge and inspiration. So let's read it – believe it -- live it -- and share it -- in Christ's love. Pastor Sue
